2014 IN State Meet

Silent Shores Club Dominates 2014 IWSA Championships

Danville, IN – The Silent Shores Ski Club relied on a high club participation rate to win the 2014 IWSA Championships team title, recruiting family members to take up skis and join the fray. This proven technique had not been so successfully applied since the early 70's when northern IN public lake ski club members lounging on shore would be recruited to enter the last event in the tournament – Jump – to garner team points, no matter their experience in that event. This mostly slalom-oriented Silent Shores club grabbed a gob of points in Trick competition where points are to be had in many divisions just by entering. In order to get their lone Jump score, though, SCSC members pooled their resources to buy a round trip plane ticket for member Megan Lambert to return from North Carolina.

A reliable witness attending dinner the night before the tournament at the home of SSSC stalwart John Warne, reported that Warne's daughter, Kate, and her boyfriend gleefully announced their intentions to get married. Papa John hugged his daughter and said, "That's great, Sweetie. You're first off the slalom dock tomorrow morning."

A classic July Thunderstorm greeted skiers early Saturday morning – lightning, high winds, and torrential rain. Clearing skies around 10AM brought officials out of the Detty house, skiers and fans out of cars, and the tournament was underway. Because of the late start Tournament Director Brian Detty was forced to re-schedule late afternoon Trick events to Sunday morning. An exception was made to that revised schedule and Men 8 Tricks was run on Saturday, ostensibly because one participant had a conflicting obligation on Sunday morn. Suspicion abounded that the real reason the 3 skiers in Men 8 Trick affected by the proposed schedule modification were unified in their appeal to ski Saturday afternoon was that coming off the dock early Sunday morning would not give Glucosamine and

Chondroitin joint-relief capsules enough time to be effective.

GRASS ROOTS SKIERS SERVE NOTICE!

son Pratt, Middlebury, brought his posse (Mom, Dad, and little brother) along to watch him tally 42 buoys on the way to a win in the Grass Roots Boys 3 Slalom event. Mason, a multi-sport athlete, showed great promise and enthusiasm as did all Grass Roots competitors.

GIRLS/BOYS

Caroline Sogard and Lauren Goldman comprised the Girls 3 Slalom field. Skiing a Personal Best, Lauren missed completing her 28 MPH pass by half a point, scoring 47.5 buoys – take heart, girl. Next time! Caroline has been training at Sawmill with Mssrs. Tynan and Sam Jackson, and it showed as she rounded 1 at 28' off the line for the division title.

Blake Dawson (Boys 1) was just coming out of the water behind the towboat when his older brother, Vince, shouted that a water snake was cruising around buoy #1. No truth in that, of course, but once an idea is planted the imagination does run wild. Later, Blake slid a couple of fat slugs in Vince's Slalom binding before the elder sib kicked his foot deep into the rubber. Initially thinking that his foot pad was just extra squishy with residual soap, Vince spent the rest of the morning getting the slime off his feet and over a week to get the smell out of his binding. Peyton Crowthers outpointed the distracted Vince, 64 to 55.5 buoys, to win Boys 2 Slalom. Blake Miller left his Jump skis at home, but remembered Slalom and Trick skis, winning both events in Boys 3. 3 at 28' off and 1650 points in trick isn't a shabby performance. Nathan McIntyre was 2nd in Boys 3 Slalom, and ably assisted the announcing crew with skiers' scores. McIntyre employed tournament vendor Chris Walker's Spotfree cleaner-waxer to bring Dave Jarrett's Malibu towboat to a gleaming shine. McIntyre gets a gold medal for volunteerism!

MOMS/DADS/MARRIEDS/SINGLES

Speaking of new skiers, Abby Schmitt Tranchita brought a cute baby girl to Hawthorn Lake to watch her Daddy, Jim, take home blue ribbons in Men 2 Jump and Overall (117' and 1832 points). Changing roles, Jim bounced baby on his knee as Abby scored 1.25 at 22' off to win Women 2 Slalom, and place 2nd in Trick with 2080 points. The tyke's gene pool is deep enough to ski on!

Molly Harrison grabbed another state meet crown in Women 2 Trick, scoring 3400 points in the process. Wednesday Night Jump aficionado Amanda Cumming was 3rd in Trick but inexplicably did not Jump! Next year I will have some skis for her though she may need to wear several pairs of socks to pack the bindings. Shannon Buchanan was 1st in Novice Women 2 Trick and 2nd in Women 2 Slalom.

PaPa Jim Tranchita was 2nd in Men 2 Slalom, scoring 1.5 at 35' off, trailing winner, and veteran dad, Casey Contos, who swam home from #4 buoy though at super-short 38' off. Tournament driver Matt Beck was 3rd, Charles, aka "Aaron", Hutton 4th, and Cody Sharkey 5th. In Men 2 Trick Cody had no match, scoring 2850 points to put Tranchita in the runner-up slot. Hutton and his training partner, third place Men 3 Slalom skier Ben Bailey, are classic big lake skiers, rising early to get calm water at Salamonie Reservoir. Commitment!

WOMEN/MEN

DeeDee Tucker in Women 6 and Prissy Edwards in Women 7 each soloed their way through all events in their respective divisions. Prissy scored 1703 NOPS points toward her Overall win. After skiing to the dock and kicking off her jump skis, Dee Dee - nursing a painful blister on her heel - had to jam her ouchy foot back into her binding and take a few extra passes by the Jump before a bona fide split time could be recorded, qualifying her for Overall. Rushing to the defense of driver Matt Beck and boat judge Beaster Detty, Chief Driver Gary Hall showed great courage when informing Ms. Tucker that no jump score could be registered because the timer was malfunctioning. Many would have invented a split within tolerance and radioed it in.

Posey County, Indiana is home to Timberlake Ski Club and Women 5 Slalom champ Jean Schmitt, rounding 4 buoys at 30 MPH.

Dan Reed continued testing his Slalom set up for the full width course in MP3 Disabled competition, but rounding #2 eluded him on his opener. In Men 4 Paul Miller and Tony Lambert each rounded 2 buoys at 38' off, but in the Slalom run-off it was Miller who prevailed. Paul Goldman was 1 buoy back in 3rd, and Brad Beerman scored 2.5 at 35' off for 4th. Todd Rau, returning to action after shuttling softball playing daughters for several years, was 5th with 1.5 at 35' off. John Warne was 6th, Brian Detty and Rob Driver tied

for 7th, and another skier returning to competition after an extended absence, Mark Qualkinbush, was 9th. Mark won Trick with 540 points, followed by Lambert and Rau. Warne won Novice Men 4 Trick on the strength of a Front to Back, B-F, and a side slide or two. Rau and Qualk squared off in Jump, each sporting vintage jump skis and safety gear. Mark saved his skis and landed on his posterior, three times burying it too deep to ski away and giving the win to Todd (52')

For all Jumpers, or Wanna-Be Jumpers, who want to see how perfect technique results in cat-like landings instead of the fanny-dunking, flailing landings performed by some older, self-taught, veterans – see Andrew Schmitt. This young lad, raised by a pack of Jumpers in the hills southwest of Evansville, is among the sport's elite. "Beaster" Detty, on his home site, got three extra attempts to card his three scoring jumps. Though fatigued he ripped a 172 footer, the long jump of the meet, to win the Men 1 event. Schmitt was second at 133 feet.

Slalom World Record Holder Nate Smith, recovering from pre-season injuries - a broken leg suffered in a jump off a seawall and road rash from a "jump" off a moving motorcycle – and non-plussed by the "C" classification for the meet entered and scored .5 buoy at 41' off in Men 1 Slalom. Detty was 2nd with 2.5 at 35' off, and Schmitt was 3rd. Detty won Trick with 2730 points, also sealing the Overall trophy. Schmitt was second in Trick, falling early on pass #2, also finishing 2nd Overall.

Open Men Trick specialist Jared Sharkey awed spectators with a 4660 point set (well under his norm) behind an unfamiliar boat - the CC Nautique was disabled by a transmission cable failure. Sharkey was spotted downing a Coca-Cola immediately before skiing behind Jarrett's ski boat. Unable to ski behind the familiar Nautique he decided to calm his nerves with a Mailbu and Coke.

In a good field of Women 1 skiers we were happy to see Jenna Gilbert returning to form after a broken foot had sidelined her for part of last season. Gilbert won Trick, even with a blowout on her first trick in pass #2, outscoring Megan Lambert 660 to 290. Lambert rounded 3.5 buoys at 28' off for 1st in Slalom, with Gilbert in 2nd with 2.5 at 22' off, with Slalom specialists Paige Ruddick in 3rd and Saige Driver 4th. Ms. Lambert was the only Women 1 Jumper, with a 40' best for the win and Overall. Kate Warne grabbed some more

team points for Silent Shores, winning both Slalom and Trick in Women 1 Novice.

Marla Lott was one of two event specialists in Women 3, she taking Slalom with 1.5 at 32' off in typically fine form, and Jodie Schmitt winning Trick with 660 points, all in pass #1. I missed introductions, but guess that Jodie and Tom Schmitt, Trick champ with 1270 points and 5th place Men 3 Slalom, drove to the meet together as a wife/husband team.

Neal Clark, a newlywed himself, slept downstairs the week before the meet so he could concentrate mind, body and soul on Men 3 Slalom action Saturday. Mission accomplished! 2 Buoys at 38' off for the win, and a stellar 400 point Trick run for another first place credited SSSC – now go home! In the crowded 6 skier Men 3 Slalom field Jeff Cross got 1.5 at 35' off (2nd), Bailey 3rd with 5 at 32' off, Scott Morton 4 @ 28' off (4th), Schmitt in 5th with 2 at 28' off, and Bryan Dougherty 6th with 4.5 at 15' off.

Another skier returning to action is Chris Susott, just feeling his way along after suffering a bicycle crash a year or two ago which left him with significant injuries. In Novice Slalom Chris found his way around 5 buoys in pass #1.

SILENT SHORES HOTTIES

Three Women skiers appearing in the "Real Housewives of Silent Shores" pilot, under review by network execs at E!, tallied muchos puntos for the Boone County club. Spectacularly smoldering Women 4 slalom winner Kimberly Black (1 at 28' off) appeared on the starting dock wearing a dark blue lycra swimsuit that didn't seem substantial enough to stand up to the rigors of the sport. She was overheard telling Jennifer Lambert that the stretchy little number assured male spectators', scorers', and hubby Lance's eyes – "any and all", she said - would be attentive. Ms. Lambert, an intensely hot summer spent alone with her man, Anthony, interrupted while daughter visited, pouted that she couldn't put that 28 MPH pass in her rear view mirror like she had so many suitors, pre-Tony. Before skiing her Women 5 Trick winning set (1930 points) SKI TV's star of "Sugar Creek Wives", Patty Patterson, complained to husband "Mikey" that if he didn't start spending more attention to her and less on the shiny Plymouth Barracuda in the garage he'd be sleeping in it.

SAFETY FIRST

Medical histories were taken by Chief Safety Director Diane "DeeDee" Tucker before certain skiers were OK'd for competition. Questions remain on how the Affordable Care Act will impact physician's revenue, but pre-tournament care delivered to Les Bender, Glen Reid, Tom Danford, Larry Smith, Don Bucher, and the elder Sharkey, Randy, cause medical residents specializing in orthopedic and farm/industrial trauma to be confident that student loans can be paid off early.

VETERANS

The only Men 5 skier to compete for Overall, champion Tom Danford, carded a 2190 point Trick set and an attempt, a pass, at the Jump, both for the win, and a 4 at 35' off 4th place Slalom run. Kim Contos settled on one of the four skis he'd been practicing on right up to the tournament, but up and down wind conditions spooked him into a different starting rope length and, rattled, missed by one buoy matching the 4 at 38' off winning run laid down by Kevin Smith. Chuck Walker's 4.5 at 35' off was 3rd, Mark Powers was 2.5 buoys off Chuck's pace, and Mark Schmitt was 6th followed by Daryl McIntyre.

SENIORS

Dale Johanning and John Kniesly renewed acquaintances on the Men 6 Jump dock and then went out and had some fun flying as far as they cared to, or should for that matter! Dale took 5th in Slalom, trailing Steve Gilbert, Steve Plummer, Mike Patterson, and Kniesly. In Trick Paul Manning upset Plummer's quest for gold, scoring 2130 points to Plummer's 1870. Though hardly making it to the starting buoys, Kniesly also Tricked and, thus, won Overall. A tip for Dale: pack Trick skis for 2015.

SENIORS PLUS

The foursome of Gary Hall, Randy Sharkey, Dave Jarrett, and Larry Smith brought hope to much younger Men 6 and Men 5 skiers that their own histories might be equally as long and distinguished as this group of Men 7 skiers. Injury prone, you bet. Surgically repaired, of course. Backsliding, inevitably. But above all, reliable. Sharkey took his zillionth IWSA State Trick title with 840 points. Smith trailed Sharkey with 490 points. Jarrett opted for Novice Men 7 Trick (Novice? Men 7?) taking 1st with 240 points. Gary Hall set a new

Men 7 Slalom mark with 3 buoys at 35' off. Smith trailed in 2nd. Not explained was why Larry Smith opted to forgo in this division an event, Jump, which he has dominated from day one.

SENIORS AD FINITUM

The sun was setting, ironically, when Men 8 stalwarts Glen Reid, Les Bender, Howard Little, and "Gene the 'Chine" Lamberson took to the water. Bender's opening salvo was a 2 buoy set in Slalom which caused Trick specialists Little and Lamberson to pick up their Cypress Gardens Lil' Monsters and walk off the dock. Reid, however, had been practicing, and how! 15' off. Then 22' off. Then 28' off. Six, Six, and Six. (Writer's note: the original text was "Six, Six, Six", but was changed by the Editor) At IWSA Men 8 Slalom record short-line 32' off Glen jumped hard on #1. "Too hard", said Lamberson, wincing as if he could feel the tendons in Reid's back and shoulders popping. Reid scrambled around #2, but at 3 ball... he went down. Thunderous applause and cheering greeted Reid as he dog paddled to shore. Once there his fellow Men 8 competitors attempted to hoist him onto their shoulders, unceremoniously giving him a wedgie before thinking better of the idea and putting him back on terra firma.

Trick competition followed, and it was here that Little was hoping to find the traction he'd been seeking all summer. "The 'chine" opened strong with 160 pts. in pass 1, but Gene's 60 point second pass cast a funereal pallor which crept across the lake. Next up, Reid threw down a good first pass – 640 points! Alas, he'd shot his wad and wobbled to a 330 point second pass, still making Little sweat some on the dock. Howard's pass #1 was decent – 690 points worth of handle passes and wake tricks, but leaving him exposed to a runner-up slot if he were to a screw up early in pass #2. The gritty Lake Freeman skier did not disappoint. Pass #2 would feature a 720 point barrage of toe tricks and other stuff that totaled 1410 for the set, and the win! Now the group was off to the Jump dock. 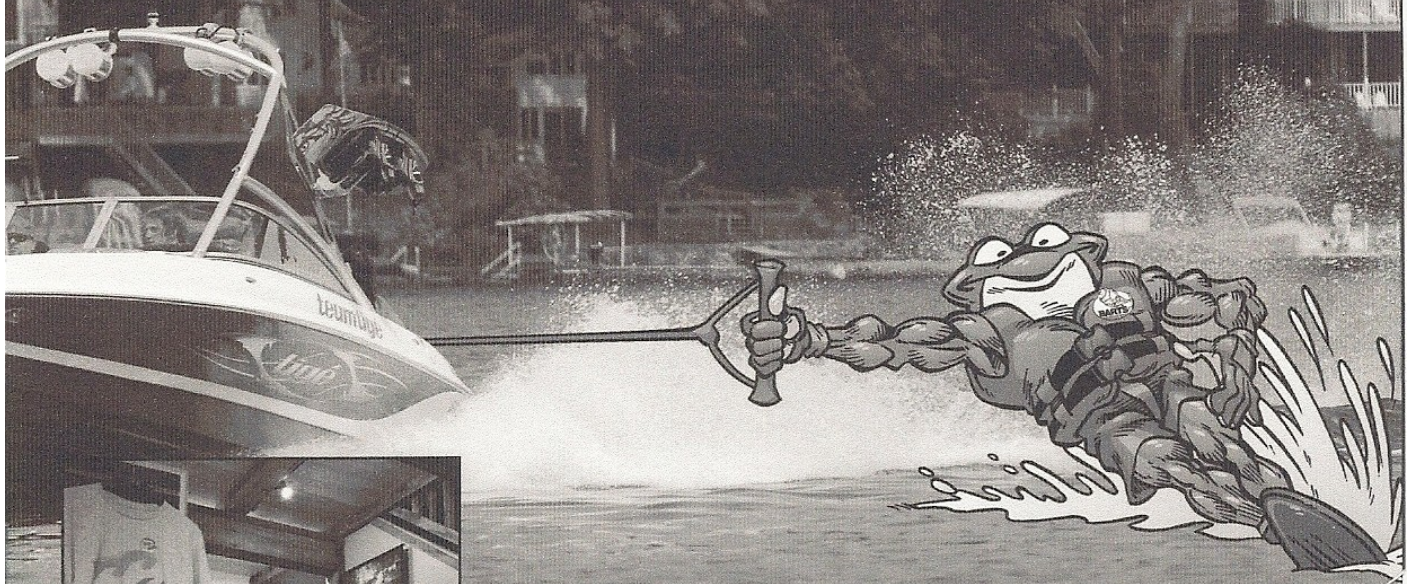
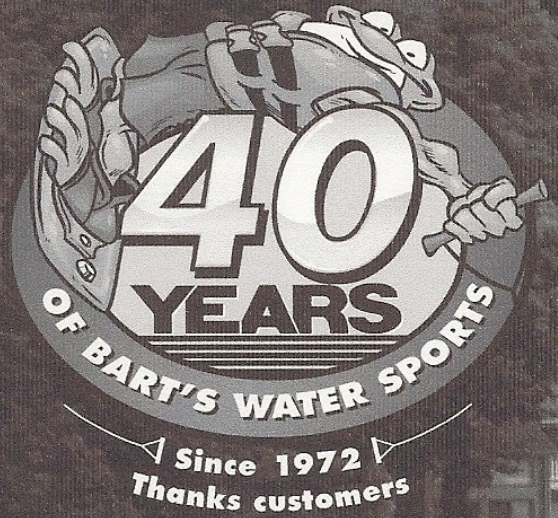

Congratulations to all these skiers for representing the Indiana Water Ski community with all the above outstanding accomplishments..



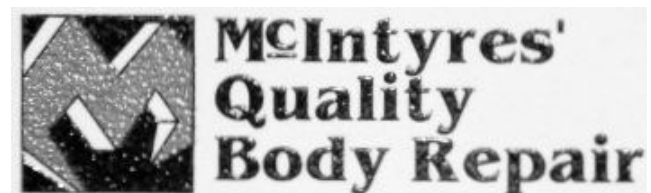
Texas Beckons Skiers to US Nationals

Hall of Fame Inductee - Kim Contos

After a failed attempt by Kim's older sibling 3 year earlier they were able to teach Kim to ski at the family lake cottage on Lake Tippecanoe at the age of 9. A trip the same day to the local marine resulted in Kim coming home with a pair of "Little Skipper" skis. He had caught the "ski bug".

Kim was introduced to the slalom course, an 'old school' bleach and milk jugs vintage a few years later by his big sister and her friends. In 1970 when the Tippy Lake skiers disbanded Kim wanted to stay involved in show skiing and try tournament skiing. He knew that the Ski Bees of Lake Webster was "the ski club". So he went to Socks Marina on Webster where the Ski Bees performed their show where he met a twenty something guy who was barefoot and wearing cut-off jeans with a piece of ski rope for a belt. He pumped gas at the marina and served as salesman for the water ski equipment in the showroom. His name was Bart Culver. Bart introduced Kim to Jan Wade and her family who's family had a cottage right down the channel. He began skiing with Jan and her family daily. He became friends with other families of the Ski Bees such as the Plummers, Clarks, and Peckinpaughs. In 1970 he joined the masses in a huge novice boys field at the Indiana State tournament in Elkhart skiing all three events. In 1971 he won his first state title in Novice Boys Tricks.

In the fall of 1973 he began college at the University of Tampa where one of his teammates was Rusty Carter Jr. also of Indiana. Kim earned a varsity letter for skiing at Tampa. Yes water skiing was a varsity sport at Tampa.

In 1974 Kim opened Kim's Ski Shop and Ski School on Lake Tippecanoe. Notable students were Kris Golden (future National Champion), Bud Roby (a top junior jumper), and a couple from Indianapolis, Nancy and Daryl Harrison.

In 1975 Kim qualified for his first Midwest Regional Championships, In 1976 earned his first EP at Fairland qualifying him for his first Nationals (1977 Nationals). However he was not able to ski in the '77 Nationals due to a broken knee cap. Kim has skied in 43 State Tournament missing only 2 in his 45 years of tournament skiing due to injury. He also has skied in 31 US National Championships.

Kim has won more that 3 dozen state titles in slalom, tricks, and overall including "Outstanding Male Skier" award for highest NOPS score. He has held many state records in Mens 2, Mens 3, Mens 4, Mens 5 Slalom. He also has held number Midwest Regional Slalom titles, records, and Ranking List Championships.

Kim has had numerous National podium finishes including a three way tie for 1st in Mens 5 slalom in 2010 (ending up 2nd after 2 run-offs). He placed 3rd in the inaugural Big Dawg Championship in 2004. He qualified for and competed in the past two 35+ World Championships in 2012 and 2014. He won the silver medal in Men 55+ Slalom in Mexico in 2012, finishing 2 buoy behind the gold medal score.

Kim was the 1994 Rollie Williams Award recipient. He is a Senior Slalom Judge, and former 3 event Assistant Judge. He also has served on the IWSA board numerous years. His personal best skiing performances is 4.5 @ 39.5 @ 34 mph and 3 @ 38 @ 36 mph in slalom, 3100 points in tricks, and 117 ft. in jump.



Hall of Fame Inductee - Steve Plummer

Steve started skiing on Lake Webster in 1965. In 1967 he joined the Ski Bees and began to show ski performing toe hold skiing on a canoe paddle, pyramid, ski around the boat, jump, 3-man barefoot, and clown acts.

In 1967 Steve skied in his first State Tournament and has competed in 47 state tournaments and counting. He joined Water Ski Inc. in 1976. He served as the IWSA president (1980-83). He has been an AWSA

judge for 31 years - a Regular Scorer and Judge since 1983, and a Senior Judge since 1991. Steve has served a Chief Judge at IWSA State Tournaments and a appointed Judge at the Midwest Regionals. Steve has received credit for judging and scoring over 800 events.

Steve has participated in Slalom, Tricks, and Jump at State, Regional, and Nationals. His best finish at Regionals was a 2nd in Jump. He received the Mark Wiggs Longest Jump Award at the State tournament in 1982. He has held a few state records and has won the State Crash Helmet Award in a year he can't remember (best crash award). He received the Rollie Williams Award in 1984.

Steve's personal best tournament scores are 3440 in Tricks, 135 ft. in Jump, and 4 @ 32 off in Slalom. And his most unusual skiing experience is skiing behind a helicopter on Lake Tippecanoe.



Steve is the manager Bart's Water Sports and Bart's has always been an outstanding supporter of the Indiana Water Ski Association.

Grassroots Skiers of the Year — David Marbaugh and Chris Banguis

Chris and David are ski partners and members of the Indy Skiers Water Ski Club. This June Chris and David both entered their first tournament, a Hoosier Buoy Stop hosted by Brewski Lake in Indianapolis. The event was especially memorable as David finished in first place. Both skiers left with a smile and a new enthusiasm for tournament water skiing. They also promised that they would be back for another event.

And back they came, David and Chris both entered the second Hoosier Buoy Tour Stop at Boondocks Lake. This tournament had a unique component as it featured a head to head final. This day was Chris's to shine. He outlasted all skiers and won the head to head final. Chris and David also skied in the final Hoosier Buoy Stop at the Boondocks. Their overall point total throughout the Hoosier Buoy Tour season was ironically exactly the same and good enough for third place overall. Chris and David's enthusiasm was much appreciated and we hope they become a stable in Indiana tournament water ski scene.



Comeback Skier of the Year - Dan Reed

But for 5 minutes of early season skiing at the 2013 IWSA Spring Fling this skier's summer was a total bust. Just days after Spring Fling he was diagnosed with a serious infection and was admitted to the hospital, where he spent the entire season and into the Fall confined to a hospital bed. He underwent surgery and was infused with massive amounts of antibiotics, finally beating the infection and getting discharged in October. This lost 2013 season would have included his participation in the 2013 World Championships.



With encouragement from many IWSA friends, notably Jerry Hodges and members of Indy Skiers, this guy made great progress in slalom during the 2014 season. His comeback culminated with a trip to Georgia for the US Nationals, a personal best 57 foot jump good for a silver medal, and selection to the 2015 US Disabled Water Ski Team, his 4th consecutive selection to the team.

The 2014 IWSA Comeback Skier of the Year, Dan Reed, will compete in California during the 2015 World Disabled Water Ski Championships.

Trick Skier of the Year - Molly Harrison

Skiing season this year seemed extremely short. Heavy spring rains, river flooding and complicated work schedules dampened practice times for Molly. A big “thank you” to Dave Jarrett for inviting Molly to ski at the Spring Fling...it was her fifth time to ski for the year. Tournament season began with Hawthorne and trick scores in the 3800 to 3900 point range. As summer continued her tournament scores remained really good. Regionals this year was the highlight of the season with a 3810 trick run, a first place finish. Her highest run this season was 4060...her personal best in 4720. As the season ends, Molly looks forward to next year and maybe using one of the new skis that she bought at the past two Nationals...a new D3 and new Quantum. It is just so hard for her to give up that water-logged D3 with the duck-taped hard shell binder and those 1990 pink board shorts.



Volunteer of the Year - Neal Clark

This skier got his start early in the spring when he and his buddies put in the buoys at the ski course in mid-March. It should be noted that he did put in more three

buoys. They then proceeded to ski in the 43-degree water. Soon after, as a Master Craft promo representative he took possession of his new 2014 boat and spent many hours tweaking and adjusting to make it both a great skiing and driving boat. He qualified for both his regular and regular driver credentials. He is a frequent practice driver as his ski club. He served as tournament director for four tournaments. He placed first in Mens 3 slalom at State and second at the Midwest Regionals. He posted a personal best of 2@39.5' off at the Fall Sawmill Tournament. In addition to all this, he even found time to get married.



Male Skier of the Year - Nate Smith

Indiana's own home grown Open Mens slalom skier Nate Smith continues to “wow em” all over the world! Even with an 8 week interval for a non-skiing related recovery his accomplishments for 2014 are amazing. Nate placed 1st in all of the following pro events: Region Reunion Water Ski Cup (France), Pan Am Games (Columbia), U.S. Masters (Calloway Gardens, GA.), Pan America Festival (Mexico), Malibu Open (Wisconsin), Master Craft Pro Shoot Out (Canada), California Pro-Am (Bell Aqua, CA.), Jack Travers Splash for Cash (Florida), and U.S. Open (Florida). That is not only amazing it is dominating! And don't forget he is the current World Record Holder at 2 1/2 at 43 off.

Skier of the Year - Jared Sharkey

Jared was invited to ski in first pro event at the Dutch Masters pro trick tournament in Schiedam, Netherlands where he placed 7th. The tournament was broadcasted on national television in the Netherlands.
